AUGUSTANA DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT 2015

THANK YOU for your partnership in the Augustana District. We are blessed to be one of the 12 Districts of LCMC. 2015 has been a significant year of ministry and mission!

The Augustana District is a non-geographic district. We consist of 58 congregations from 10 states that span from Washington to Georgia and from Oregon to Texas. Most of our congregations hail from Minnesota. There are 73 pastors on the Augustana clergy roster.

The key words that best describe our purpose are these: *Theology. Church. Mission.* We seek to serve LCMC congregations by tending to theology. Lutheran theology is our gift to share with others and our responsibility to interpret for our context. Alongside this, we also support and encourage churches. This can mean any number of things. Some examples include sharing resources and staff, aiding in the call process or conflict resolution and partnering with congregations for creative programs. Our theology and our work together as churches is all about proclamation – that is, proclaiming the good news to all people from "Jerusalem to the ends of the earth." This is called the Great Commission and it is carried out locally ("Jerusalem") and globally ("the ends of the earth").

To assist in carrying out Augustana's mission, we have four Boards: Board of Theology and Ministry, Board of Christian Education, Board of Congregational Missions and Board of World Mission. We also have a women's organization called WOW (Women of the Word). Our District Council is the group that oversees and coordinates our various ministries.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Given February 7, 2016, summarizing January 1-December 31, 2015

Beloved in Christ, grace to you and peace. Allow me to express my sincere appreciation for the ministry we share as we enter our 10th year together.

WORSHIP

Worship is the central ministry of First Lutheran. This past year our average Sunday attendance for the contemporary service was 49 and the traditional service was 145. I thank all who contribute their time and talent during services, especially our ever faithful and gifted music director, Brian Wick. Special thanks also for Jackie Goodmanson who prepares the projection for the contemporary service and Patti Wyss who has organized the praise band.

Ecumenical services were held on Thanksgiving Eve and Good Friday. Your pastor also leads monthly worship services at the Golden Age Manor in Amery. This past Lenten Season we participated in a Lenten rotation with congregations in our fellowship. It's good to hear another voice from the pulpit. It was a pleasure to have the Silent Messengers from Baldwin lead and excellent worship presentation concerning Christ's passion that was enjoyed by all as well.

EDUCATION

Included elsewhere is an excellent summary of the educational ministry of this congregation. Join me in giving thanks to Patti Wyss for her continued leadership as Sunday school superintendent. We also give thanks to Theresa Anderson for leading the Christmas program. These two servants, along with an army of volunteers have truly inspired and blessed our children.

Currently we have some 74 children registered for Sunday school with many regular attendees. The Community Vacation Bible School was led in cooperation with the Methodist Church and the Covenant Church with 110 kids attending. The committee has decided to rotate the location and leadership duties between the Covenant Church and our own congregation. We continue to enjoy the puppet ministry at Sunday services to introduce the rotation lessons. Volunteers attend a training program to guide our efforts. We are glad to have had some youth assist us in special puppet presentations during Easter.

New Members class in January and November and First Communion classes in the spring are led by your pastor along with Wednesday Confirmation instruction for 8th and 9th graders. I also lead a monthly Women of the Word and bimonthly Lutheran Men in Mission Bible study. Our third Bible Marathon began in January and we had many participants. What undergirds all of my teaching is a trust and respect for the inspiration and authority of God's Word.

Bible Camp Promotion Sunday was held in March and we were successful in recruiting 11 attendees this year. Efforts have been made to strengthen our ministry to youth this past year. In cooperation with area congregations a community Christian youth fellowship has been birthed. They have taken the name, "CLAY" (Christ Led Area Youth). We hold monthly events for fellowship, serving our neighbor and deepening our faith. Special thanks to Jackie Goodmanson

for taking the lead in this area. Many thanks to all who helped with the installation of the playground donated by Mike Lund. This was a big project for the joy of our congregation's children and others who stop by to play.

MISSIONS

We are called by Christ to care for the lost and the least. Your church has done much with our women's prayer shawl and quilting ministries. The ongoing grocery collection for the local food pantry as well as our annual toy drive nets generous giving back to our community. We thank those who continue to sew dresses and shorts. Please also consult the benevolence giving as detailed in the Treasurer's report. Yours is a giving congregation!

Each year we welcome a Gideon evangelist and take a special offering to assist with their distribution of Bibles. The Women of the Word continue a collection of School Kits for Lutheran World Relief. Your pastor serves on the local Child Evangelism Fellowship Board. We continued our sponsorship of Child Evangelism Fellowship as a partnering missionary of the congregation. The local director is Lisa Inlow and the offices are in the Clear Lake Community Center. We also continue supporting missionaries from the World Mission Prayer League. One of their missionaries to China, John Gronseth, shared his work and testimony in October to the benefit of all. They have about 100 Lutheran missionaries serving throughout the world. Our high school youth with chaperones, took a week in June to work on a servant team through Youth Works in South Dakota. Finally, thanks also to all who contributed so generously to the Military Bible Sticks this year.

Your pastor encourages each individual of the congregation to continue to reach out to invite the lost to seek Christ and to serve all people in kindness and love. Let your light shine!

MEMBERSHIP

Currently our total membership is at 580 souls. Seek to join me in welcoming the 30 new members who united with the congregation this past year. You will see a tabulation of the various pastoral acts elsewhere. Our hearts go out to those having lost loved ones.

Our fellowship continues to grow and toward that end let us be ever mindful when visitors join us. We need to be extra hospitable as we extend warm greetings, share names, and invite others to join us at the fellowship hour or Bible study. Our ultimate goal is to bring all into Christ's Kingdom.

We had a budget surplus this year with all bills and missions commitments paid on time. It was especially gratifying that we were able to make considerably more payments to reduce the mortgage rather than the minimum. It would be such a blessing to find a buyer for the old church but nothing has been forthcoming. The Council will have to seriously consider its options in the upcoming year.

In closing, I thank you all for what God has been able to accomplish through us during 2015. Let it be our prayer for God's will to be done as we seek to grow His Kingdom.

Sunday, February 15 was utilized as Bible Camp Promotion Sunday and 11 First Lutheran Children attended bible camp this past summer.

Rally Sunday was held on September 13 as we kicked off the Sunday school year. Theresa Anderson directed the Sunday School Christmas Program with the help of many volunteers. This gift of song and story, "Around the Manger" was presented at 2:00 in the afternoon on Sunday, December 20.

The rotational model requires the commitment and involvement of numerous members of our church family. As teachers, they bring their talents, experiences and gifts to share with our children. We thank them and ask the Holy Spirit to continue to stir their hearts to stay involved with this very important work of the church. Theresa Anderson and Stacia Hoefferle write and perform puppet shows to introduce each rotation. Brian Wick provides weekly piano music for opening and Theresa Anderson accompanies the kids on guitar several times throughout the year. Leona Voss works as a consistent volunteer in the preschool room. Theresa Anderson, Michelle Nelson, Patti Wyss, Nikki and Alex St. John and Brayden Christensen attended a Creative Children's Ministry workshop in March. We extend a special thank you to all of them for their ongoing dedication to the Christian education of our children.

CONFIRMATION

Eleven 10th graders were confirmed on Sunday, October 25th. Confirmation instruction is held on Wednesday evenings for 7th-9th graders. Tim Wyss and Theresa Anderson team teach the 7th grade class. They study the Gospel of John. Pastor Bryan is the instructor for the 8th and 9th graders. 8th graders are lead through a Bible overview and the 9th grade works their way through the Small Catechism. Youth group and regular worship attendance are also encouraged. Each youth must turn in a minimum of 20 sermon notes a year and acolyte on a rotating basis. All Confirmands are also expected to attend a week of Bible Camp in the summer or a servant trip during the three-year program.

Congregational Report 2015

Thank you for being an Association Member Church! We cherish our role as an extension of the ministry that happens in your congregation. We are thankful for your support in 2015 and look forward to our ministry opportunities together in 2016.

In February 2015 we welcomed a new executive director, Dr. Paul Hill. Paul has a long history in outdoor ministries as a director, high adventure facilitator, speaker and teacher. He is currently leading a research team on effective camp practices. Connect with Paul at paulhill@campwapo.org.

Early in his leadership transition, Paul completed a six month Major Assessment of LWLBC. You can read the document on our website (campwapo.org/news). The assessment is a critical starting point in helping the board and staff evaluate current programs, plan new ministry experiences, and create strategies to better serve our constituents and congregational partners.

The theme this past summer was AMAZINGRACE, emphasizing both the unconditional grace of God in Christ, and the call to run the amazing "race" of serving others as Christ's disciples. We hired 201 college-aged summer staff to work with campers. We were inspired by their courage to answer this call to ministry, their dedication to kids, and their unwavering willingness to serve.

Certainly a highlight of the year was the completion of the purchase of Wilderness Canoe Base, the camp we have been managing since 2001. In 2014, we were presented with the unique opportunity to assume ownership of the camp. With the help of many amazing friends of Wilderness we are on track to raise the last \$287,000 to complete our \$1.3 million Renewal campaign for the purchase of Wilderness.





Luther Dell saw some physical improvements this year, including a new beach, a reinforced deck on Sunwall, and continued work on bathrooms. Luther Dell continues to be a favorite get-away for families and youth groups. We treasure our relationship with YouthWays Ministries and are grateful for the Luther Dell summer camp experience we can provide for these kids.

The summer programs at Wapo consistently draw large numbers of youth campers. We are

so grateful for the opportunity to walk alongside these young people. In 2015, almost 200 campers attended one of several Wapo One Day programs and the waterfront boasted a new water trampoline. Our retreat ministry continues to fills the year round calendar. We are thankful for these guests who come away to quilt, scrapbook, sing, worship, meditate, pray and play.





Ox Lake hosted a variety of programs last summer. One highlight for staff was a new Day Camp for local youth. We were thankful for a faith-filled, flexible and hardworking staff. They welcomed their campers with gusto and grace.

We are profoundly grateful for the friends who pray for this ministry on a regular basis and for those who support us with financial gifts, and for the hundreds of volunteers who give the gift of time and talent. Lifeline Food Pantry – 2015 Annual Report

"Be generous and share your food with the poor. You will be blessed for it." Prov.22:9

Another year has passed and because of the generosity of our supporters, Lifeline Food Pantry was able to offer food assistance to many families in the Clear Lake and Clayton areas. We are so grateful for the donations we receive. Thank you!

During 2015 our local pantry distributed over 111 ton of food. Donated funds allowed us to purchase over \$24,000.00 in food items. Our resources come from grants, churches & church groups, community drives, individuals, civic clubs & groups, and businesses. Core contributors are our area churches and individuals. The bulk of our purchases are made from Second Harvest Heartland; the upper mid west's largest hunger relief organization that constantly accepts and distributes donations. As an agency partner, we are able to receive items from them for pennies per pound, thus monetary donations offer us more 'bang for our buck' ⁽ⁱ⁾

Lifeline Food Pantry is recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as a non-profit organization described in section 501 (1) (3). Your contributions are tax deductible. LFP is one of 32 host sites for Westcap's TEFAP (*The Emergency Food Assistance Program*) A federal program offering commodities to supplement the diets of low-income needy families, including the elderly, by providing them with emergency food and nutrition assistance. Our pantry and our clients meet eligibility requirements to receive these items.

We are open for service twice per week and emergency contact information is posted for those in need. Currently we support an average of 165 families that follow our 'once per month' visit policy. We sincerely respect our client's privacy and confidentiality is a priority. The statistics below represent our normal service activity.

LFP is also one of 13 local host sites in Westcap's seven county service area for the seniors only *Commodity Supplemental Food Program.* Low income seniors who are pre-qualified (age 60+ and at or below 130% of the federal poverty level) will receive a box of assorted commodity foods as a nutrition supplement. The USDA commodities arrive at the pantry and LFP distributes on behalf of Westcap. On average, 90 individuals benefit from this monthly program. This service is separate from normal pantry operation.

We look forward to the area's annual 'Christmas for Children' project. Each year, gift boxes are prepared to furnish program coordinators with a generous amount of nutritious foods to distribute to families participating in this program. Our local Lions Club offers their support by providing a Christmas meat for these boxes.

Our many volunteers are priceless. Without them we would be lost. They unselfishly give of their time and energy. They are all greatly appreciated and true assets to our team effort. **Thank you** to everyone. I am always overwhelmed by God's faithfulness in providing for our pantry's needs. May you be blessed as you continue to support the work of Lifeline Food Pantry and our mission to fight hunger in our community.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Our First Lutheran family continues to grow and give generously to the Church. In 2015 giving towards both the general fund and the building fund exceeded budget requirements. In the general fund this allowed us to complete several projects, most notable the expansion of the parking lot and reroofing the parsonage. The building fund (mortgage) commitment has been met each month and with the excess given to the fund and with the benefit of several large fund raising projects, (the Clear Days garage sale, basket raffle, and smorgasbord to name a few) we have continued to pay down the principle. This is important as we start to move forward with discussions on when to build the new sanctuary. Through your continued support either by monetarily gifts or volunteering your time, many other projects too numerous to note and many that go unnoticed were also completed.

Please review the attached 2016 proposed budget and note changes from 2015 resulting in an increase just under five thousand dollars. It is important to note that at current giving levels we ended 2015 with a generous excess of slightly more than \$21,000 and the 2016 budget even though higher than 2015 should still show a potential excess at the end of the year. We have added four large projects to the bottom of the budget for the congregation to consider. Given the money left from last year and the projected excess from this year we should be able to complete all these projects if the congregation so desires.

As Christians we are called to do God's work and produce good fruit. Our giving of monetary gifts and gifts of time and talents allow us to "grow God's family" both internally within the walls of this Church and externally as you can see by the list of external benevolences provided. The committee gives special thanks to Kyle Overby for serving as church treasurer and Wayne Severson for serving as financial secretary. We also thank the many counters that assist council members after each service performing that task.
