2023 Augustana District Annual Report for Congregations

A TIME OF CHALLENGE AND OPPORTUNITY

Much has been said and written about "LCMC 3.0." The purpose of this report is to frame this within the context and future of the Augustana District. At the last Annual Gathering, participants were asked to provide input around five particular areas of LCMC 3.0. Focus groups met around the following areas: Global Missions, Conflict Management, Intentional Interim Ministry, Clergy Shortage/Next-Gen Leaders/Creative Staffing, Districts and Fellowships.

THE NEW ROLE OF DISTRICTS

In order to resist the temptation of addressing the challenges listed above through the hiring of more LCMC staff, districts have been challenged in new ways. According to the LCMC website, there are currently eight U.S. districts. All of them are considering ways to address at least three of the challenges listed above: Conflict Management, Intentional Interim Ministry, Clergy Shortage/Next-Gen Leaders/Creative Staffing. All district and fellowship leaders will meet in conjunction with the Board of Trustees and Ministry Board (June 26-28) to address these challenges.

AUGUSTANA DISTRICT

As the Augustana District, we remain committed to the ministry we have always had as a priority. At the same time, we are committed to addressing new needs that arise and other areas of ministry (beyond those listed above). For instance, we added a Sr. High Youth Retreat and a First Call Retreat last year. We plan on continuing both. We are also planning to offer call coach training within the district. As one of the larger and more organized districts in LCMC, we continue to provide an important leadership role for other existing districts, as well as new ones.

THANK YOU

Augustana is the sum of the congregations that make up our district. THANK YOU for your prayers, financial gifts and support that comes in many ways. We are served well by a dedicated staff, boards and district council. As we look to 2024, Psalm 143:8 comes to mind: Let me hear of your steadfast love in the morning, for in you I put my trust. **Teach me the way I should go,** for to you I lift up my soul.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Given February 11, 2024, summarizing January 1-December 31, 2023

Beloved in Christ, grace to you and peace. Thank you for our shared ministry as we enter our 18th year together.

WORSHIP

This past year we averaged 35 people at the first service and 98 at the second for an average total worship attendance of 133. We continue to livestream on Facebook. Brian Wick deserves our special recognition for his musical leadership. Thanks to Jackie Goodmanson for preparing the projection for the contemporary service. We hope to encourage in person attendance as the norm this year. The Council is discussing going to one service during the summer months this year.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH

Thanks goes to our Sunday school superintendent, Patti Wyss for her fine leadership of the program and her army of volunteer teachers, especially Theresa Anderson who led the Sunday school Christmas program to the delight of us all. What a joy to have over 100 kids participate in Community Vacation Bible School this year, hosted by our church. We are always looking for volunteer Sunday school teachers so please consider serving.

This year our high school youth will journey to Indianapolis, Indiana for a week of service and outreach. High School youth continue to meet Wednesdays for Bible study and breakfast. We continue to offer meals on Wednesday nights and the youth room is open and supervised by parents from 5:30-8:30 PM. Youth group has been meeting once a month for activities with a few family events sprinkled into the mix of programming. Special thanks to Dale Wirth who cooks for the youth on Wednesdays.

MISSIONS

All of our mission commitments were met again this year. We celebrate the many quilts made and donated by our quilting group along with dozens of school kits sent around the world through Lutheran World Relief. Many local children were blessed by our annual Christmas toy drive in cooperation with the Methodist Church. Our Easter Egg Hunt Outreach was another great success along with our Red Cross Blood Drives. The Women's Event in February has become a very well attended annual event. All new movers to our area received a welcome postcard from the congregation. We are starting a ministry to visit those people in person as well, called Project FISH (Friends Inviting Sharing Hope). Don't forget to take a prayer shawl to those in need of extra support and thanks so much to those who make the shawls.

MEMBERSHIP

Currently our total membership is 591. We will be seeking to update our membership list this year along with completing our online photo directory. There is hope to move into more electronic communication as well so help us get your latest contact information updated with the church office. We grieve the loss of two members this past year: Myrna Paulson and Shirley Warner-Buhr. Remember their families in your prayers and acts of love. Our greeter corps is now welcoming all who come for Sunday services. Consider how you might do your part to graciously welcome and receive newcomers at worship.

FINANCES

Thanks to our membership we have a financially stable congregation during trying times. That is no small accomplishment! Meeting all general fund expenses as well as a significant mortgage is a challenge. Remember the office has established an online giving portal on our church website as well as a QR giving code on Sunday bulletins. The proposed 2024 budget was reduced to reflect the downturn in the economy and reduced offering. We had to rely on fundraisers to meet the shortfall to the General Fund but all bills and benevolences were paid.

Join me in prayer and hope as we strive to build up the body of Christ here at First Lutheran. Let's shine brightly for Christ as we seek to know Christ and make him known. As our mission statement says, "Growing God's Family by Serving".

At an August meeting, possible choices for the 2023-24 Bible study groups were discussed. All women who are members of First Lutheran church are considered WOW members, and are placed onto one of our serving groups for funerals. MEN'S BREAKFAST AND BIBLE STUDY

The Lutheran Men in Mission for Christ (LMMC) has been the men's ministry at First Lutheran Church for 33 years. The group provides fellowship and spiritual growth through Bible study. The group meets on the first and third Saturday mornings of each month and any man is welcome. The group is typically ten to twelve men. The morning activities include coffee and breakfast served at 6:30 by a volunteer followed by Bible study lead by Pastor Bryan from 7:00 to 8:00. In 2023, we read through Philippians, Philemon, Hebrews and started Matthew. We generally read and discuss only one chapter of the book during a session, so studies are thoughtful and deliberate with time for discussion.

No prior Bible study experience is needed to fit in with this group. Any man who wants Christian fellowship with other men and wants to explore his faith through Bible study should join us. No reservations are needed and the church office will even put you on a mailing list to receive a reminder if you desire.

To support church mission projects, in 2016 we began selling shopping cards to some of our favorite local merchants. The shopping cards are available at church each Sunday and can be used like a debit or gift card. The men's group purchases the cards at a discounted price from the merchants and makes them available to you at face value. You receive the full value of your purchase! When you shop with these cards from the men's group, you are supporting local businesses while supporting church missions. We currently offer cards for Nilssen's Market, Clear Lake True Value and Kwik Trip.

Among the ongoing missions of the LMMC is the monthly financial support of Child Evangelism Fellowship (CEF) which is located in the Clear Lake Community Center (Pastor Bryan serves on their board). LMMC also financially supports the Wednesday evening meals for the confirmation classes and youth group, makes a gift to the youth Mission Trip, supplies the apples for the Sunday School Christmas program and pays for some church lawn care work. A past project was the purchase and installation of the defibrillator in the gathering space. The number of missions supported will increase as more funds become available through breakfast offerings and your purchase of the shopping cards.

EDUCATION AND YOUTH

SUNDAY SCHOOL

There are currently 43 children enrolled in our Sunday school program- ages 4 through grade 6. We continue to use "on-line" registration utilizing a "Google form".

First Communion for fifth-grade students was held on Maundy Thursday, April 6. The following students received their First Communion: Tristan Barney, Maci Buhr, Olivia Buhr, Jay Case, Nevaya Larson and Kya Schnider.

First Lutheran Church continues to utilize a rotational model for Sunday school. "The Good News Bible" was distributed to the 6 Sunday school students entering third grade and is used through confirmation. "The Beginners Bible" is given to and used by children when they exit the cradle roll and is used through second grade.

The 2022-23 scope and sequence of curriculum lessons used (published by Augsburg Fortress) included: "The Burning Bush", "The Red Sea", "The Lord is my Shepherd", "The Banquet with Simon", "Ten Men Healed", and "The Wedding at Cana". Sunday, January 29 was utilized as Bible Camp Promotion Sunday. Fifteen First Lutheran Students attended WAPO Bible Camp last summer and two attended Arrowhead Camp. The Women of the Word support their attendance with a \$150 campership for each student.

Rally Sunday was held on September 10 as we kicked off the Sunday school year. Theresa Anderson directed the Sunday School Christmas Program with the help of Lily Anderson, Natalie Petersen, Tiffany Wagner, Kiley Munson, Lisa Anderson, Kristen Wallace, and Cindy Nilssen. This gift of song and story, "God's Christmas Promise" was presented at the 10:00 service on Sunday, December 17.

The rotational model requires the commitment and involvement of numerous members of our church family. As teachers, they bring their talents, experiences and gifts to share with our children. We thank them and ask the Holy Spirit to continue to stir their hearts to stay involved with this very important work of the church. Theresa Anderson and Stacia Hoefferle continue to write and perform puppet shows to introduce each rotation. We thank Brian Wick for helping with music during opening when possible. We also extend a special thank you to all who volunteer as teachers for their ongoing dedication to the Christian education of the children of First Lutheran.

Youth group and regular worship attendance are also encouraged. Each youth must turn in a minimum of 20 sermon notes a year and serve the congregation in some capacity. All Confirmands are also encouraged to attend a week of Bible Camp or a servant trip during the summers.

The youth continue with supper on Wednesday nights before confirmation classes. Special thanks to our main cook Dale Wirth. Summer 2023 This summer we welcomed nearly 4000 campers and families to Camp Wapo, Ox Lake and Wilderness Canoe Base, including 90 guided canoe trips into the BWCAW. This year's summer staff was excellent. They were required to be flexible, resilient, and filled some important leadership roles. They rose to that challenge full of energy, grace and servant hearts. Strategic Plan Initiative We continue to work on Strategic Initiative focusing on three main Strategic areas: Identity, Inclusivity, and Generosity/Engagement. In 2023, a task force of talented theologians and pastors created a theology framework document that will serve as guardrails for the good of our campers/guests and overall ministry. The Diversity, Equity, Accessibility, Inclusion (DEAI) committee has been created and secured funding for a DEAI assessment to happen in 2024. A development audit has been completed highlighting strengths and areas of growth. We continue the work on comprehensive site plans that will help us provide meaningful and transformative outdoor ministry experiences for all.

We celebrated 75 years of ministry at Camp Wapo on Aug 6th with a bluegrass worship and celebration lunch. We welcomed over 400 people for our Memorial Day Pancake Extravaganza. We had our 21st year of the Wapo Golf Tournament, and hosted over 1200 guests and volunteers in Advent with 8 performances of the 34th annual Christmas Dinner Theater "For the Love of Christmas Lefse".

Mission Support Fund This year we had 2 matching gift challenges to inspire new donors. One generous friend of camp offered a \$50,000 summer giving challenge and Wilderness Canoe Base received a \$20,000 gift match for GiveMN's Give to the Max day. Our donors rose to the challenge, responding with \$70,000 in gifts. Overall, we also had a tremendous response to our Mission Support Fund appeal to support operating and camper scholarships, raising well over \$500,000. Every gift has a life changing impact on thousands of lives each year.

Our theme for 2024 is "Always" Hebrews 13:8 "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever" and 1Thessalonians 5:16-18 "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances." LIFELINE FOOD PANTRY – 2023

Kindness is doing what you can, where you are, with what you have... No act of kindness, no matter how small, is ever wasted. Aesop

Hard to believe another year has come and gone and a new year has begun. During this past year, through the generosity of our supporters, Lifeline Food Pantry was able to offer food assistance to many families in the Clear Lake and surrounding areas. With the help of other organizations, LFP was able to supply additional food to families in need.

Our donations come from church groups, community drives, civic clubs, individuals and local businesses. We have also received money from grants that have helped in the purchase of food. The bulk of our purchases come from the St Croix Food Bank, which is in Hudson WI, however, this year we have had to use local grocers to purchase basics like milk and eggs. As an agency partner, we can receive items from the food bank for pennies per pound, thus monetary donations go a lot farther.

Lifeline Food Pantry is recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as a non-profit organization and contributions are tax deductible.

We are open for food distribution twice a week and are available for emergency food boxes or short-term service for anyone in need. Our contact information is posted on the Clear Lake Community website. We also have started a Facebook page where we try to post any news that we may have. This past year, we supported an average of 79 families that followed our once per month scheduled policy. However, we understand that some may need additional help and are more than welcome to return. On the second and fourth Wednesday of the month our clients are encouraged to stop in for the additional foods and fresh fruits and vegetables that come in on those days.

We respect our client's privacy and confidentiality is a priority. The statistics below represent annual service activity. You will note our numbers have started to go up due to the increase in the price of basic needs. If you know of anyone in your area who could use a box of food, even if it is for a month or two, please encourage them to come check out the food pantry. If you know of anyone 60 years of age or older who could use food, please encourage them to check out our commodity program.

LFP continues to operate as a host site in Westcap's seven county service area for the seniors only Commodity Supplemental Food Program. This program is for low-income seniors who will receive a box monthly of assorted commodity foods. The USDA commodities arrive at the pantry and LFP distributes them on behalf of Westcap. This program is in addition to the regular food pantry service. This year we served an average of 45 individuals on our monthly Commodity service.

The Lifeline Food Pantry would not be here if not for the volunteers and we have been truly blessed with many wonderful volunteers who unselfishly share their time, talents, and energy in picking up and helping to organize and distribute food. Thank you to all who generously offer help in any way. God bless you as you continue to support LFP's mission to fight hunger in our community.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT

Well another year has come and gone, the property committee, Dennis Luehman and Bill McIntire, with the help of others, had our share of issues and fun projects this year.

We started with a large remodel project at the parsonage. This included: new cabinets, new built-in dishwasher, new hood/microwave combo, new kitchen sink and faucet, new counter tops and pantry addition. Special thanks should go to Dennis for heading up this project and completing the majority of it on his own!

This past spring with all the snow fall, we had an ice dam form on the roof above the quilters closet which caused some minor water damage and a minor problem with the sprinkler system. We cured the problem and fixed the fire sprinkler matter with the help of Summit Fire Protection. We also found some issues with the exhaust fan vent on the roof for the family bathroom and repaired the vent damper. We replaced the belts for the exhaust fans for the public restrooms too.

Regular maintenance was done on all heating and air conditioning units: filters changed and flame sensors cleaned.

We relocated the storage shed and Nativity scene on the south side of the building and so far it seems to fit there perfectly.

We had some major issues with the fire system as it wanted to call Bill at all hours of the night and day to tell him there was an issue. With Dennis's help and Bill's help and a few other people outside the church family, the issue was resolved and we are on a watch system which seems to be going correctly.

We also had a professional carpet cleaner come in and shampoo the carpets and then purchased our own carpet cleaner.
